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## I. Introduction

For ten years, the Philippines has remained steadfast in its commitment to energizing participation, civic spaces and public enhancing inclusive digital revolution. amplifying discourses on anti-corruption, and strengthening transparency and accountability reforms as one of the founding members of the Open Government Partnership – a coalition founded by innovators and democratic players who believes that a government whose doors are open to its people, is a government that is trustworthy and responsive to their needs.

From eight (8) countries and nine (9) civil society organizations in 2011, the OGP has now expanded to 78 countries, 76 local governments, and thousands of civil society organizations bringing in hard work and innovation towards empowering people to influence, inform, and partake in making policies and decisions directly affecting them.

The Philippines has been recognized as a global leader in the open government community throughthepresenceofchampionsandreformers in various national and local governance landscapes—from high-level political leaders, career officials, civil servants, and civil society actors—who work hand-in-hand in advancing open government reforms in the country. The direction of the Philippine Open Government Partnership is driven by a multi-stakeholder group called the Steering Committee, which is composed of equal representation from the government and non-government supported by two Secretariats from both sectors.

The PH-OGP action planning and development process is characterized by participatory consultations, strong multi-sectoral partnerships, and open and constructive exchanges. This has led to credibly implementing action plans co-created with key civil society stakeholders and are driven by the high level buy-in and support from state officials and leaders.

To improve on its multi-stakeholder processes and design and implement more ambitious commitments, PH-OGP action plans are subjected to an assessment conducted by thirdparty researchers through the Independent Reporting Mechanism (IRM). The IRM regularly reports on the methodologies, results, and context of each action plan and publishes its assessments.

The Philippines' action plans were built from the country's commitment to improving public services and upholding public integrity anchored on a paradigm which seeks to widen the spaces for citizens in their very own government, hold public leaders to account and ensure that the benefits of governance reach the grassroots. This commitment is even more strengthened because PH-OGP framework is linked to various governance frameworks such as the Sustainable Development Goals and the Malasakit Pillar under the Philippine Development Plan 2017-2022 under. The PH-OGP is also the main consultation platform of the Participatory Governance Cluster of the Cabinet or the PGC whose mandate is centered on bridging the Philippine government to the citizenry through active public engagement.

During the Philippines' tenure in the Partnership, it has successfully co-created and implemented four (4) national action plans, with the fifth plan on its mid-implementation, which responds to a broad range of national issues. The hard-fought changes for a more transparent, accountable, and citizen-oriented governance have positively affected bureaucratic efficiency, economic resiliency, and greater citizen participation in the country.

The PH-OGP overcame the challenges of political transitions through a strong bureaucratic support from career officials which helped in gaining the trust of the current Administration. From the three action plans by 2016, two impactful action plans highly reflective of the goals of open governance followed.

Drawing from the wealth of experience in designing and implementing four action plans, the fifth PH-OGP NAP came to fruition through the groundbreaking shifts in the country's strategy based on the belief in the ability of democratic tools to create transformation in the governance setting. Through this, the fifth country action plan is recognized as the most demand-driven and most inclusive action plan spanning sixteen multi-sectoral consultations in all regions of the country. The significance of direct citizen engagement in shaping the PH-OGP NAP for 2019-2021 is exemplified. This resulted to 11 game-changing commitments focused on genuine co-creation and transformative outcomes driven by a more convergent government.

However, in early 2020, the COVID-19 has sent the entire global economy in a rapid downturn bringing more Filipinos to a vulnerable state. The health crisis drastically changed the global situation and disrupted economic activities and government projects including the implementation of the action plans of OGP member countries. The expected delays in the implementation of action plans prompted the OGP Criteria and Standards Sub-Committee to release a Resolution allowing one-year extension on the implementation of action plans, which is until August 2022.

It is in these extraordinary times that the world has shone a brighter light on the importance of participation and public accountability the very heart of OGP. Gearing towards addressing unprecedented challenges brought by COVID-19, the PH-OGP Steering Committee released a set of guidelines to help commitment holders in the revision and implementation of their milestones during the pandemic and how they can infuse pandemic response indicators in their commitments. This has resulted in the Revised PH-OGP NAP for 2019-2022 which was relaunched last December 16, 2020.

It is through this Report that the PH-OGP intends to continue facilitating the exchange of mutual trust between the government and its citizens and to deliver more outstanding and impactful results which can be felt by those in the margins. This shall provide a documentation and assessment of the process undertaken during the design phase of the PH-OGP NAP 20192022. To make this Report a comprehensive learning tool, sections are allocated for the discussion on learnings and recommendations to enhance the PH-OGP process and increase the level of ambition of PH-OGP NAPs. This is also to comply with the Office Performance Commitment Review (OPCR) of the Fiscal Planning and Reforms Bureau (FPRB) under the Office of the Undersecretary of the Budget Policy and Strategy Group.

# **II.** Crafting the 5th National Action Plan (NAP)

The PH-OGP 5th National Action Plan (NAP) remained consistent with the previous NAPs in the co-creation process that it underwent. The commitments enrolled in this NAP met the criteria set up by the PH-OGP Steering Committee:

anchored on one or more OGP values, the status quo,

with national government support,

co-created with civil society,

focused on improving public service delivery, and

with specific, clear, measurable, achievable, time-bound milestones

Its enhanced co-creation process has led to ten (10) international commitments to be delivered by a more convergent government. Efforts at achieving a wider and more extensive participation at the grassroots were doubled as the OGP team went around the sixteen (16) regions of the country to be able to craft the Citizen's Agenda.


Over a thousand non-government organizations were consulted through the Dagyaw Regional Townhall Sessions. In addition, sectoral consultations were conducted to ensure inclusivity where the marginalized sector had representation in governance. This includes indigenous peoples, children and youth, women and LGBT, among others. This process characterizes the follow through intention of the current Action Plan, where the commitments are aimed at delivering effective and efficient service to the people, beyond lip service by a government that listens, responds and delivers on its promise. The 5th NAP is the first Action Plan where the development process was initiated by the non-government sector. The pro-active engagement of partners resulted to inclusion of the participatory monitoring of the last mile schools, the participatory action research to help address early pregnancy and malnutrition and the institutionalization of social dialogues for the public sector for the DepEd, DSWD and DOLE commitments, respectively. It also features co-creation of the implementation and monitoring plans of the commitments to ensure that these will be efficiently monitored.

The development process of the 5th NAP considered the strategies and recommendations in the following national and international governance frameworks, policies and publications: Philippine Development Plan (PDP) (2017 – 2022), UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), Participatory Governance Cluster of the Cabinet Performance and Projects Roadmap (PGC-PPR), Independent Reporting Mechanism (IRM) Philippines, OGP Point of

Contact Manual, OGP Participation and Cocreation Toolkit, and OGP Handbook on Rules and Guidance for Participants.

Three months into the implementation of the current Action Plan after its formal launch in December 2019, the country along with the rest of the world was adversely affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. This led the OGP Criteria and Standards Sub-Committee to issue a Resolution allowing for extension of the Action Plan implementation of active member countries. Hence, the PH-OGP

Steering Committee issued the Guidelines on the Extended Implementation of the 5th PH-OGP NAP which allowed commitment holders to revise existing milestones and their timeline or include commitments related to Covid-19 response. The co-creation process in the revision of the 5th NAP was sustained as agency-led and Secretariat-led consultations were conducted in revising the Action Plan. A revised 5th NAP was finalized and launched virtually in December 2020.

## **IV.** Implementing the National Action Plan (NAP)

The 5th National Action Plan contains ten (10) commitments currently being implemented by thirteen (13) government agencies, together with six (6) non-government agencies which is first from the past action plans. The revisions made on the 5th NAP following the extension allowed by the OGP Criteria and Standards Subcommittee Resolution have allowed for inclusion of some commitments and additional milestones which contribute to the COVID-19 response. The Presidential Communications Operations Office (PCOO) added a milestone to facilitate the proactive disclosure of all COVID-19-related information from national government agencies. Its co-commitment holder, Youth Alliance for FOI (YA4FOI) has additional milestones on conduct of consultations on the FOI Bill, convening of multi-sector network of CSO advocates for FOI, creating tech-based tool for feedback from citizen experience on access to information and creating a tracker of public accessibility of Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Net Worth (SALN) among agencies.

## V. Peer Exchange Learning

The Philippines has been consistently at the forefront of OGP circle both at the national and international engagements and participated various activities at the global level. Below are several engagements that Philippine stakeholders have actively participated since 2019:

### 2019 OGP Global Summit in Ottawa, Canada, May 29-31, 2019

On May 29-31, 2019, Director Cristina Clasara headed the Philippine delegation in attending the 2019 OGP Global Summit held in Ottawa, Canada. On the last day of the conference, the Philippine government in partnership with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) led the summit session entitled #CivicTechTalks: On Closing Feedback Loops and Bridging Accountability Gaps. The Philippine government delegation also participated in bilateral meetings with the OGP Support Unit and The World Bank. Several resource persons from government and non-government members of the Philippine delegation were also invited to speak in various side events and sessions throughout the duration of the conference.

### OGP Multi-Donor Trust Fund (MDTF) Peer Learning Workshop, September 22-27, 2019

The Philippines is among the six (6) countries that attended the Open Government Partnership (OGP) MDTF Peer Learning Workshop at Fairmont Hotel in Dubai, United Arab Emirates on September 22-27, 2019. The PH-OGP delegation is represented by DBM's Assistant Secretary Rolando U. Toledo, Mr. Robin T. Gumasing and Non-Government representatives Ms. Jennifer De Belen and Ms. Mhafe Del Mundo from Caucus of Development NGO Networks (CODE-NGO).

The objective of the workshop is to provide just-in-time technical and peer assistance to country actors in the development and implementation planning of their OGP Action Plans. It also provides an opportunity to all MDTF awardees to converge, share experiences and learn from other participating countries on how they go about each co-creation stage including expert advices from the OGP International Support Unit.

### Open Response + National Action Plan Presentation for Malaysia, June 23, 2020

The Philippines was invited to participate in the Open Response + NAP Webinar organized by the Malaysian Government on June 23, 2020 to share the country's experience in the crating and development of the National Action Plan, the Multi-stakeholder process, challenges and lessons learned.

### VI. Key Lessons and Recommendations

### A. Sustaining Co-ownership and Joint Decision-Making

The PH-OGP Steering Committee has been actively involved in the implementation of the 5th NAP. Status on the revision and finalization of the NAP as well as periodic reports were discussed in the Steering Committee Meetings. As the monitoring framework and reporting tool were revised, the Steering Committee continued to provide guidance and direction by jointly approving the revised reporting tool, among others. The good working relationship between Secretariat and the focal persons from the commitment holders proved effective in monitoring the status of NAP implementation.

### B. Addressing Bottlenecks in Implementation

Implementing transformative open government commitments proved difficult in the time of pandemic. Bilateral meetings with commitment holders were conducted and they were able to provide status of implementation to the extent that the agency or institution was able to do at their level. Focus on Covid response and recovery efforts affected implementation of some of the commitments.

After finalization of the Project Status Report (PSR) by the Secretariat, commitment holders were able to report through this revised monitoring tool the status of their implementation as of June 2021. The Secretariat did an initial desk review of the submitted PSRs and conducted meeting with the respective commitment holders. This is one way to address any bottlenecks in the implementation. The PSRs showed that majority of the commitments are on track, completed or with substantial implementation while others have not started or remained for completion until the end of the NAP cycle. It can be noted that from the government commitment holders, the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP), the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the Department of Tourism (DOT) have more milestones that are either not started or with limited implementation. Follow through meetings on addressing bottlenecks should be forthcoming but difficulty in scheduling and the other intervening activities was a hindrance. Focusing on the commitment holders with some difficulty in implementation should be done towards the latter part of the NAP cycle to ensure that they are able to catch up and make good on their commitments.

One of the projects were decided to be discontinued such as the Project DIME of the DBM. Consequently, the status of the commitment implementation as of the last reporting in the PSR would be the end-of-term status for this commitment.

### C. Measuring Performance and Identifying Outcomes

While the commitments have milestones or indicators that are measurable, others are worded as continuing activity or in such a way that could be difficult to measure. Determination of the status of implementation then becomes a challenge as some of these could be implemented until the end of the NAP cycle. As suggested by the Steering Committee, it would be good to identify the outcome that the commitment intends to achieve and show the link between the milestones and the intended outcome. This could be done in the succeeding Action Plans moving forward.

The monitoring framework that is being refined by the Secretariat would do well to include determining indicators for the commitment milestones and identifying outcomes for these milestones.

The regular reporting of the commitment holders through the PSR submission should be sustained to help them with their catch-up plans for milestones with delayed implementation. As part of the documentation, the submitted PSRs will be uploaded in the PH-OGP drive that is accessible to the Steering Committee, the commitment holders, other interested partners and the general public.
